People Working Cooperatively (PWC) Reports \$190,000 in Grants During Final Months of 2014 to Make Critical Home Repairs in Greater Cincinnati

Cincinnati, OH (June 24, 2015) – People Working Cooperatively (PWC) announced today that grants received in the final months of 2014 totaled \$190,000.

“We are so grateful to the organizations and individuals who are helping to fund critical repairs all across Greater Cincinnati,” said Chris Owens, Vice President of Development for People Working Cooperatively. “Each dollar is used to help keep local residents safe in their homes.”

Through the funds collected in the final months of 2014, 161 low-income homeowners received critical home repairs and modification services, Owens reported.

Grants were awarded from the following organizations:

Middletown Community Foundation: \$20,000 for repairs in Middletown

Community Foundation of West Chester/Liberty: \$10,000 for repairs in West Chester/Liberty

The John A. Schroth Family Charitable Trust, PNC Bank, Trustee: \$50,000 for modifications

Scripps Howard Foundation: \$10,000 for repairs in Northern Kentucky

Hatton Foundation: \$25,000 for modifications

The P&G Fund of The Greater Cincinnati Foundation: \$25,000 for repairs and modifications

The Carol Ann & Ralph V. Haile Jr./US Bank Foundation: \$50,000 for emergency repairs in the city of Cincinnati
