Building for the Future: People Working Cooperatively to Relocate Headquarters in 2026

The nonprofit will move to Sharonville to serve as the operational hub for its 135 employees

CINCINNATI (May 2, 2025) – Local nonprofit <u>People Working Cooperatively (PWC)</u> has secured a new location to serve as its future headquarters, growing its mission to provide critical housing services so that low-income families can remain safe and healthy at home. The organization plans to move its workforce from 4612 Paddock Road in Bond Hill to the former Sugar Creek Packing Co. building at 3440 E. Kemper Road in Sharonville in the first half of 2026, pending renovations.

"As we celebrate the last 50 years and look ahead to the next 50, we remain committed to providing emergency home repairs, energy conservation, accessibility modifications and other services as part of our Whole House approach, strengthening communities one home and one family at a time," said Jock Pitts, president of PWC. "This new facility will provide us with the space and resources needed to grow our impact within the Greater Cincinnati and Northern Kentucky region."

PWC Board Members Dave Neyer, Greg Shumate and Teresa Huxel provided invaluable expertise, advice and guidance throughout the purchase. SHP is managing the design of the future space, and Unit Building Design will begin construction later this summer.

"What we're most excited about with this new location is that it will allow us to serve more individuals and families, more efficiently, keeping them safe and independent in their homes," said Pitts. "This building is the foundation for that, allowing us to bring all our operations under one roof, making our impact bigger and stronger than ever. We're excited for what the future holds."

Founded in 1975, PWC is celebrating 50 years of strengthening homes, families and communities by providing critical home repairs, energy conservation services and accessibility modifications for low-income, elderly and disabled homeowners in the Tristate. With a team of more than 130 full-time, licensed professionals and a dedicated network of volunteers, the organization completes approximately 7,000 service projects each year, ranging from emergency services to installing wheelchair ramps to improving insulation to fixing plumbing and electrical issues, all to keep their clients safer and healthier in their homes.
